Our current issue features a corrosive and skeptical examination by Michael Chanan of the AI hype we are all subjected to these days. Rhett-Lawson Mahajer and Tara Rava Zolnikov then offer us a revealingly speculative trans-theological essay, "The Gospel According to Fairbairn." Judith M.
